A Light in the Darkness

"My eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all people, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel" (Luke 2:30-32 NIV)

Do you recognize those words? We often sing them, or a variation of them, right after Holy Communion, the Lord's Supper. Do you know who spoke them? Simeon sang that song right after he held the eight-day-old Jesus in his arms. For his entire life Simeon had been waiting to see the Messiah, God's Anointed One, who would console Israel regarding the darkness of her sin and guilt. Simeon trusted this Messiah would come but as he waited, it still felt like there was some darkness in his life.

Simeon's waiting game is not unlike what we go through every year in December. We anticipate a bright day coming in the month; we even trust and know it will happen. But the darkness still hovers around. And I'm not just talking about the dwindling hours of daylight in December. For many, December and the holiday season bring darkness or amplify it. Like a thick, wet blanket of snow, it muffles the sounds of joy everyone else seems to be making. Like a long commute home from work when the sun has already set an hour prior, this time of year dims the radiance that all the festive lights tell us we should have.



Each person's darkness may feel different and be associated with different things.

You may battle stress as deadlines flood over the dam of your schedule. Another feels sapped of energy because of chronic pain or sickness. Still another stays up all night, feeling guilty for all the ways he has let down his family in Christmases past. The feelings and struggles may differ on the surface, but they all have the same root: sin. Our sinful nature obsesses over schedules instead of spending time in the Word. Our bodies break down because sin has infected this world and is breaking down everything in it. Our guilt darkens our minds and hearts because we know there is no way we can ever make them completely right, especially before God.

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In these days darkened by a lack of daylight and made even worse by the sins we commit and the sinful effects we feel, dear Christian, be brightened by the light which Simeon saw. The eight-dayold baby he held was already a beacon of hope for all people, Jew and non-Jew, Israelite and Gentile. Jesus was – and is – salvation and spiritual light embodied!

The Father had prepared a plan to break the night of sin and death and the devil through this child born of Mary, and the plan was now in full swing. Jesus grew up and died to become the glory of the nation of Israel; the Savior has Jewish DNA in the blood he spilled from the cross. Jesus grew up and preached the gospel to reveal to the Gentiles the light of forgiveness; he would take away the sins of every people from every nation, without cost and with undeserved love.

May this glorious light of the gospel, seen by Simeon in the temple at Jerusalem and beheld by us at Living Water, brighten even your darkest days! It may not make you literally jump for joy as you continue with physical pain or personal depression. It may not make you do cartwheels as you walk back from the Lord's Supper. But it will strengthen your faith. The gospel of Jesus, the Son of God who became true human for us, has revealed a light that will never fade or go out. That makes us sing with Simeon. So, among all the Christmas carols and hymns you sing this December, add to them the Song of Simeon – a song meant not just for after communion or during Christmas but for every day of a Christian's life, especially when you and I need a light in the darkness the most.

In December we have extra chances to see that light in worship. I encourage you to join us during our midweek Advent services, or catch the recordings posted on our website. Take advantage of our Christmas Eve worship, and then turn around and get the gospel light the next morning on Christmas Day. But not only do we get to share in the light, we can share the light with others. Be on the lookout and for chances to invite friends, relatives, neighbors, or even acquaintances to see the same light of forgiveness and life eternal which God gives to us at Christmas.

The Advent Wreath FAMILY DEVOTION

THE HISTORY AND SYMBOLISM OF THE ADVENT WREATH

The Advent wreath is a combination of two very common symbols: light and the fir tree. From the early centuries of Christianity it has been a common practice to represent Christ's presence with a burning candle. The fir tree also has a long history of religious use. The evergreen nature of fir trees symbolizes eternal life.

It seems that the Advent wreath originated a few hundred years ago among the Lutherans of eastern Germany. A wreath of evergreens, made in various sizes, was either suspended from the ceiling or placed on a table in believers' homes. The general symbolism of the Advent wreath lies in the growing light of the wreath, increasing each week as we approach the birthday of Jesus, the Light of the world. Eventually, Advent wreaths made their way into church decorations.

The colors of the candles are symbolic as well. Some choose to use purple candles in their Advent wreath. In Advent, we hear John the Baptist's call to repent. Purple is a color of repentance. It also symbolizes the royalty of Jesus Christ.

Other choose to use blue candles in their wreath. Blue is the color of the sky. It reminds us that in Advent we look forward, not just to Christ's first coming on Christmas, but to Christ's second coming on judgment day. The third candle of the wreath is generally a rose color, symbolizing the joy we have in Christ. Come Christmas, a fifth candle—white, representing Christ himself—is placed in the center of the wreath.

The Gift of Hope

Most people think that "hope" is an optimistic feeling that in the future things will work out for the best. *"I hope I don't catch a cold."* You might not get sick. But you also might get sick. Your hope does not have any bearing on that. But in the Bible, the believer's hope is always connected to a promise of God. God cannot break his promises. So when the believer says, *"I hope Jesus comes and takes me to heaven,"* his hope is more than an optimistic feeling. His hope is actually the same thing as faith.

The Gift of Joy

Perhaps your Advent wreath has a different colored candle for this week. On week three of Advent, we light the Joy candle, which is often rose or pink colored, a joyful shade. Joy, as the Bible speaks of it, it not quite the same thing as happiness. Happiness is about the present. If things are currently well, you are happy. If currently, you are suffering, you are not happy. But the believer's joy is rooted in God's promises of the perfect, eternal future that awaits us, thanks to the work of Christ. Thus, joy has nothing to do with present circumstances. We can be joyful, even in hard times.

The Gift of Peace

This time of year can be anything but peaceful. Our "to do" list is long. There are end of semester tests at school. There are presents to buy. Perhaps you need to make travel plans or prepare for visitors. It can be a hectic time of year. Use God's Word to remind you to slow

down, take a deep breath, and focus on what is *really* important—Christ. Let him give you peace.

The Gift of Love

The gifts we give at Christmas are meant to be a token of love. You chose something you know that they will like because you love them. You sacrifice money to buy them a gift or time to make them a gift because you love them. Gifts are a sign of love. Could there be any bigger gift that God the Father could give us than the gift of his Son? Could there be any greater gift for Christ to offer than his life as a payment for our sins? We celebrate the gift of love that God has given to us. We respond by loving him back.

All this we ask according to God's will, through Jesus Christ who lives and reigns with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.
