The Church Must Always Be Reformed

Jesus said, "If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." -John8:31,32 (NIV)

You have probably heard the calls for reform. Reform of our justice system. Reform of our immigration policy. Reform of the minimum wage employees are paid. Reform of the way we use our world and treat our climate. It seems like there is no shortage of things people want to change and reform in our state, our nation, and our world.

As much as you've heard the calls for reform from various people, you have observed the need for reform. As a Christian, you understand that so much of this world and this life and this culture is messed up. It's messed up by sin. Creation groans. Justice gets miscarried. Immigration gets blundered. And so on and so forth. As a Christian, you not only recognize how messed up this world, you recognize why it is. Humanity has lost its hold on the truth. As a result, ever since Adam and Eve, each person thinks that his or her truth is the truth that will solve the problem and bring the reform that's needed. But all these truths can't truly be true. There can only be one truth which sets things free! The rest are just sinful falsehoods which we tire of hearing through the TV.

Thank goodness our church got it right all those years ago, right? Thank goodness that when there were so many things that needed to be reformed in the Catholic Church, Martin Luther



stepped up and cleaned house, right? Thank goodness that we have a perfect hold on the truth that sets us free, right? Thank goodness that the Lutheran church and Living Water will never

ever have to make any changes ever again, right? Wrong.

Ecclesia semper reformanda est. That's the fancy Latin phrase that reformers like Martin Luther held onto. To them, that was part of the truth of what Jesus meant when he said, "If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then

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you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." *Ecclesia semper reformanda est,* "The church must always be reformed." Luther and the Reformers thanked God that he had preserved and illumined the truth of his Word – that we are saved by grace alone, as received through faith alone, as taught by Scripture alone, all on account of Christ alone. But Luther and the Reformers also knew that sinner-saints could slip in their grip of Jesus' true teachings.

As a denomination and congregation, we might get distracted by politics or money, laziness or being busybodies. We might become enslaved to sinful growth methods or to sinful resistance to change. Either way, these are all distractions that threaten the freedom we have by grace alone, through faith alone, and in Scripture alone. That's part of the reason our Council recently went through the process of evaluation mission statement options.

And so we, too, are people calling for reforms. But we don't join the chorus of people calling for secular reforms that only affect this world. We call for reform that affects our hearts and our congregation for eternity. We ask the Holy Spirit to daily reform our hearts through Word and sacrament. We ask Jesus to reform our tendency to be lenient in the way we teach and apply his truth. We ask the Father for the discipline and humility to never think that we have become a perfect change that has nothing to reform. Our hearts and our church must always be reformed by God and his Word.

The good news is that God promises to do just that. Martin Luther and the Reformers had that confidence, and so do we. That's what we celebrate every October 31 on Reformation Day! The justice system may still mess things up. Immigration could still be a hot topic. People may still panic that the world will end in about eight years. In the end, though, we sleep easy knowing that God is never done reforming our hearts by his grace until he takes us to the eternal freedom Jesus Christ won for us in heaven.

Every Service Matters TEEN DEVOTION

There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work. Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good... All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he distributes them to each one, just as he determines. -1 Corinthians 12:4-7, 11 (NIV)

"I just want to find a good job someday—you know, doing something that matters and is meaningful."

It seems to be the elusive dream of every teen. Get into a good college or trades program. Find a job that is influential and important. Do something that really makes a difference. After all, who wants to be a low-class person doing low-class work?

The apostle Paul challenges you to think differently today. There is no such thing as doing more important work than others. There is no such thing as being gift-devoid or ability bankrupt, as if everyone else has some special gift (academics, athletics, personality, etc.) but you have nothing. Whether in the world or in the church, all work and all workers are equal. Why is this?

Because it is the same Holy Spirit who distributes gifts to each person. It is the same God who works in and through each person.

So yes, some people may function as leaders in the world or in the church. Some people may have higher profile jobs that get more attention than others. Some people may make more money than others. But what of it? Different does not mean better. Each person has gifts from God and so is an instrument of God with those gifts.

Think of the bread you eat in your home. Some farmer raised and harvested the crops. Someone bought the product. Workers in a factory processed and produced and packaged bread. Truck drivers delivered it. Stock boys (or girls) put it on the shelves. Someone rang up the groceries. And someone in your family purchased it with money earned from their job. Each had a different set of skills used in a different vocation (life-calling), but God used each to provide for you and many others.

Think of a Sunday morning. The pastor often gets the limelight and attention. But what if no one replaced the lightbulbs, turned the lights and AV on, or even paid the light bill for that matter? What if no one greeted you, gave you a service folder, collected and counted the offering? What if no one played an instrument or led the congregation in singing? Or, God forbid, what if no one made coffee or had snacks available?

This is precisely what Paul is teaching. There are many gifts and many kinds of service. Each is valuable and important—both inside and outside the church. You have been given gifts and abilities by God. So friend—get to work! And trust that your service is important and valuable to God and to others. Why? Because God himself is working through you!

Prayer: Dear Lord, help me to see the gifts that you have given, to make wise use of them, to be grateful for the opportunities to serve you and others. Amen.
